





For outdoor education, we have made a welcome return to Lake 32 for SUP boarding & kayaking.




Our raised bed in the poly tunnel area now has runner beans, beetroot and sweetcorn planted out and we are experimenting with growing melons under cover.

- Number of items and pronunciation of food




Making Burgers





Inclusion means creating an environment where everyone feels welcome and valued. An inclusive environment can only be created once we are more aware of our unconscious biases, and have learned how to manage them.

What are the protected characteristics?

The following are the legal protected characteristics, under The Equality Act 2010:

Age, Disability, Gender reassignment, Marriage and civil partnership, Pregnancy and maternity, Race, Religion or belief, Sex, Sexual orientation

Discrimination on the grounds of any of these characteristics is illegal. Discrimination can take many forms including direct discrimination, indirect discrimination, bullying, harassment and victimisation.

Once a term, a group of staff meet to ensure that all aspects relating to equality, diversity, and inclusion, are represented across the 24-hour curriculum, and also to ensure pupils, families, staff, and visiting professionals, are supported and valued in all that they do, value, and believe in.
