# PEWSEY & DEVIZES


Term 6 with Sarah, Natalie, Amy, Steve, Thani and Jane.

## NUMERACY

*This term, we have been adding and subtracting fractions with the same and different denominators. We have calculated the percentages of quantities.*

*Also, we have calculated the mean, median, mode and range of numbers.*

## LITERACY

This term, we have been looking at advertising. We have played many games to identify logos and slogans. We have designed our own theme parks/games/toys/clothing, stuck to a budget, created a slogan and logo. We have also discussed target audiences.

**This term, in Science the class have been developing their knowledge and understanding of the human body. There has been a high level of curiosity regarding body systems and we have looked at the entire internal systems within fish, where the boys did incredibly well to, not only put up with the smell but, also work safely with scalpels and follow detailed instructions. We have then gone on to explore the human circulatory and respiratory systems. Pupils have completed a heart dissection and have been able to identify the key features of the heart. We have completed a demonstration of the lungs seen in the picture below and pupils have also gathered accurate data on their own personal lung capacity. The class have been great at learning the technical names for many of the parts of each system and have also been able to compare the action of the lungs to that of a tree as a means of gas exchange.**

**Even with disruption to the class through illness the students were fab! With some Star wars based learning, they knuckled down and really enjoyed the work!**




# ALTON BARNES


Term 6 with Ron & Kariss



**This term in animal care we have been learning about reptiles and jobs related to animals. We had a visit from a reptile academy, which all the boys really enjoyed.**





Term 6 with Ben, Becky & Vas




It is Hard to believe that it's time to write the final newsletter of the year!

We wish you all a happy & peaceful summer.




# CHERRILL



# The Reptiles come to Notton.....!!


On Wednesday 29<sup>th</sup> June,

### Hazing and Upskirting – KS3 and 4


Hazing is a ritual that involves risk, pain, or harm, typically as part of initiation into a group.


# ENGINEERING PROJECT



**This term Rio has been working hard on assembling a very technical radio-controlled car as part of an engineering project. Here is the progress so far:**




**The front and rear assemblies are now complete and he will be able to move onto the final stages of adding the motor and drive shaft soon.**

# Education Ofsted Visit: May 2022

With thanks to all pupils, staff, families, professionals, and the local community, in helping and supporting Notton House Academy to remain a GOOD school.

The Ofsted inspectors spent two full days with us, meeting staff and pupils, in and outside of lessons, looking at pupil work, their learning, and progress, listening to pupils read, and seeing how staff support and guide the young people with their learning, in order to become safe, kind, and independent individuals.

There is a clear, shared ethos, which is focused on improving the lives of the pupils, staff work with. Parents and carers agree that pupils are supported well and that the school has a positive impact on their child.

Pupils are encouraged to be ambitious about their future. Leaders ensure that pupils have what they need emotionally, socially and academically so that they can work towards these aspirations. Pupils are fully involved in how their learning is designed to meet their aspirations.

Pupils are fully involved in how their learning is designed to meet their individual needs. Pupil voice is an important part of all that Notton House does. Pupils know the difference they can make to the school.

Staff have high expectations of pupils' behaviour. They model positive relationships to support pupils to meet these high expectations.

Pupils show respect for the key adults they work with. Staff show empathy and have a calm and respect for the key adults they work with. Staff show empathy and have a calm and consistent approach to support pupils when they are struggling. Pupils are not concerned about bullying. They feel it is managed well by staff when it happens.
