Dear families,

Pupils in lower and middle school are working through their phonics programme, ensuring that they have the life skills in place to read and be safe. They have also been studying Great Britain during SMSC lessons. Middle school have also enjoyed their SMSC work focusing on Germany. As we move into upper school, the pupils have really embraced their option choices, with so many going off-site to mainstream colleges to study animal care, construction, and motor vehicles. Other pupils are enjoying time at Kandu studying performing arts. And yes there are some of our pupils taking a qualification in GAMING! E-sports is a popular choice for many, and the course has begun with **eagerness** from all! As we all know, it isn't all about the lessons, the academic learning, the progress, but the wider development of pupils. Over the summer holidays, so many **improvements** were made to the site including bedrooms re painted and new carpet in place, a variety of playground markings were installed for pupils to develop their gross motor skills during pe lessons, and at break time and lunch time, and Alton Barnes had a new 'quiet' tutor room created within the art room. Half term works have been referred to in this newsletter, as we continue to **develop and improve** our facilities inside and out!

Before I go, and wish you all a peaceful half term break, I do, I'm afraid, need to refer to a topic that is nothing to celebrate about. Damages. This term in Primary we have been learning about Great Britain. We have researched the three countries and their flags, traditions, emblems, food and history. We linked this learning to the Queen's state funeral and celebration of her life.



In maths we have been looking at number, learning multiplication facts and reading and writing numbers to 1000. We have also been working on using symbols for greater than and less than and finding the value of individual digits within numbers.

important to recycle for the environment. We learnt how to recycle and make our own paper.





To support our emotional well-being, we have been learning or re visiting the Zones of Regulation to discuss our different feelings throughout the day and what zone we may be in. Next term we are going to explore resources to help us to stay regulated.

Pupils in lower school have been making their own recycled paper, using sensory materials for their learning, and playing in their own sensory garden








Read Write Inc provides intensive, targeted support to address specific gaps in students' reading.

We are coming to the end of a long first term and we are all looking forward to the half term break!






At NHA, we find opportunities every week to explore, learn, and discuss: current affairs, historic moments, and national and international events, to further develop learning and progress.

Below are some of the topics we have explored. Please discuss these with your child, to find out what they now know, that they didn't know before!

International Literacy Day

Since 1967, International Literacy Day (ILD) celebrations have taken place annually around the world to remind the public of the **importance of literacy** as a



matter of dignity and human rights, and to advance the literacy agenda towards a more literate and sustainable society. Despite progress made, literacy challenges persist with at least 771 million young people and adults lacking basic literacy skills today.

Yom Kippur



Yom Kippur is the **holiest day of the Jewish year**and marks a time for atonement through fasting and prayer. Jewish men pray at the Western Wall during Yom Kippur in the Old City of Jerusalem.

World Mental Health Day

10 October every year. The theme of 2022's World Mental Health Day, set by the World Federation for Mental Health, is 'Make mental health and wellbeing for all a global priority'.

Autumn Equinox

Two moments in the year when the **Sun is exactly above the Equator** and day and night are of equal length; also, either of the two points in the sky where the ecliptic (the Sun's



annual pathway) and the celestial equator intersect.

Roald Dahl Day

To commemorate him and his achievements, Roald Dahl Day happens every year on his birthday - **September 12th** - celebrating the magic that he brought and continues to bring to children everywhere.


Damages at NHA



Damages Process




If I cause damage . .

- The staff member who sees the damage logs it on Every and Sleuth (our computer recording systems) with your name.
- 2. Your family will be told and you will have a key working session.
- 3. Our Bursar (admin office) will share the damage information with our Senior Leadership Team.
- The site team will let the Bursar know the cost of the damage.
- The police may be contacted depending on what the damage is.



6. A discussion will be had about repair work.



7. The plan is then shared with your key staff.



- 8. A letter will be sent to your family about the damage you have caused, the cost and the repair plan.
- 9. You will complete an activity to make amends for the <u>damage</u> you have caused, This could include fixing the damage cleaning graffiti, weeding, painting, tidying, sweeping, litter picking.




