

The children have been busy working on their One Up targets. Patrik has risen to the challenge, and has been using the fitness suite on a regular basis. Go Patrik!











In SMSC we have been learning all about Brazil and the Amazon rainforest. The boys have made some beautiful pictures of colourful parrots that can be found in the amazon!



It was Patrik's birthday, and staff and pupils enjoyed celebrating with him, by playing bingo! There were some great prizes.




Learning Support

David was part of the football team that visited Hardenhuish school in Chippenham where we played a good game, we lost 6-3 but everyone enjoyed themselves which is what it is all about.






Our SMSC country this term has been Venezuela, we have found out that their government is extremely corrupt and isn't a very nice place to grow up if your poor.




The second goal followed not long after as some nervous moments at the back

The second half was more of a balanced game as both Notton and Hardenhuish scored 2 goals apiece. As a first venture into proper fixtures against local mainstream schools this can only be described as a massive success, despite Notton coming out on the wrong end of a 6-3 result

Year 11 (and 1 year 10) pupils have kicked off exam season this week with some mock exams in English and Maths. Pupils have been excellent and engaged really well with the process so far. Mocks are a great way of pupils practicing for the real exams. As a result, they can learn a lot about the exam process, find strategies to help them stay calm under pressure and practice using arrangements such as supervised rest breaks.

All pupils who have taken exams will also benefit from a detailed Question Level Analysis, where their teachers can analyse the exams to identify strengths and areas requiring further teaching / revision. This process will be taking place over the next two weeks and will help us to adapt teaching to further increase the progress of pupils as we move closer to the summer exams.

If you have a child taking Entry Level or GCSE exams, you will be receiving their exam timetable. These dates are fixed by exam boards and it is essential that pupils are in school a minimum of 15 minutes before the start time for each exam.

I have also included a 'Students' Guide to Examinations'. We will run through this with all pupils at school and you may find the information useful as well.

In school the boys have been working hard in English and Maths, completing there entry level papers for maths and preparing for the exams in English. Some of the boys have completed their English mock exams over the past couple of weeks and have worked really hard in them. 




