Swimming: The children have been making wonderful progress in their swimming. It has been so lovely to watch their skills improve and their confidence grow.




Water fights: On very hot days, the boys have enjoyed epic water fights splashing each other on the playground with water guns.




We hope you all have a lovely and relaxing summer and we look forward to the pupils returning in September!

Jane bought her tortoise, called Bombie, in from home - we asked lots of questions and discovered what a tortoise feels like to touch.






With Ant, Sharon & Will

The boys were extremely disappointed there was no signal at the campsite. After erecting the tents, the boys took the opportunity to take the fishing rods down to the lake and try their luck. It got to the point that even our waterproofs didn't seem to be keeping us dry. We had a quick pit stop for lunch in one of the mountain's large cols, but we didn't stop for long as we were cold and extremely wet, and we wanted to keep morale high. We reached the top of our ascent at around 3pm and much to the relief of all, it was only downhill from there. The relief soon faded when we realised the descent was at a much steeper decline than what we had already walked, making it extremely slippery with all the rain. Tom decided it would be a good idea to save time by sliding down the mountain instead of trying to navigate the slippery terrain. Others persevered with a few slips and trips, but by the time we reached the bottom, there were smiles all round. It wasn't until we got back to the minibus, we found out our waterproof kit bags had done a better job at retaining the rainwater than it had repelling it. It was at that time; we decided to finish the expedition and return to the warmth and dry of Notton.

3 – All bikes have been serviced and repaired, we have also had anti puncture fluid (Slime) put in all the tyres.


4 – All woodwork has been re painted in the Education block classrooms.
