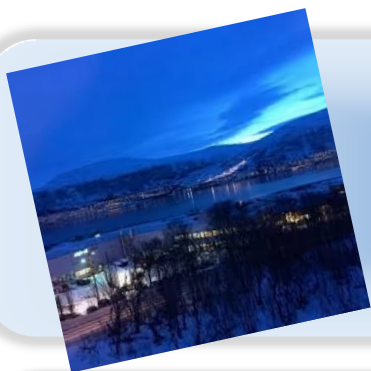

For our Humanities this term we have been looking at the Arctic circle. The boys have been discovering the types of animals that live there along with learning about the 7 countries that form part of the Arctic Circle and pairing them with their flags. They have looked at the seasons discovering that the sun never sets in the summer and winter is mostly dark. Norwegian Town where the sun doesn't rise in the winter – called the 'Polar Night'.

The Country we are studying this term is Australia. The boys have enjoyed learning about the aboriginal people particularly looking at their art work. Everyone has taken part in our sessions creating their own aboriginal art which we have combined for a classroom display. They have also discovered that this artwork can tell a story of aboriginal traditions.



This term's swimming lessons are an on-going success. All boys that take part are progressing really well. They are becoming more confident in the water, are listening to instruction really well to improve their techniques. A few of the boys have also managed to gain a certificate for swimming 5 metres or more. Swimming is one of the highlights of the week.

The boys have really enjoyed their PE sessions this term, as for two out of the three sessions it's the ever-popular trampolining. All boys have progressed with their trampoline skills some even managing to learn to somersault. Lots of the boys are also enjoying our team games session on Tuesday afternoon run by Dante from in2sports. This is an opportunity for them to work together with other students outside of their own class in fast-paced ball games.

We have had another fantastic term! We have welcomed new pupils Ja'Shai and Cameron to our class. Our students are avid football players! They have enjoyed playing countless football matches together and have greatly improved their skills in the process!



In English, our topic was 'The Owl Who Was Afraid of the Dark'. We have been focusing on diary entries. We identified the features of a diary entry, looked at ways in which a diary entry can be improved and we had a go at writing our own.

The boys have also been very diligent in practicing their daily spellings. It has been an important part of our morning routine.



In maths, we have been focusing on learning how to tell the time. We have looked at different ways to tell the time for instance with analogue and digital clocks, roman numerals to 12, and am/pm.

In outdoor education we have been taking part in the John Muir Award. We have been going to wild places such as Box woods where our students have enjoyed spending time connecting with the natural environment, getting plenty of fresh air, exploring the caves, swinging on rope swings and building dens.



This term in art classes, the focus has been on Aboriginal art. The boys have learnt how Aboriginal art depicts stories relating to the Aboriginal culture and way of life. They have also looked at the meaning behind some of the symbols used in Aboriginal art, and this has inspired them in having a go at creating their own artwork.

This term, in SMSC, we have been focusing on Fiji! We have learnt some interesting facts about this beautiful country, such as Fijian traditions, food, sports, weather and landscapes. We have also enjoyed imagining and planning our 'dream holiday' to Fiji by thinking of what we would need to pack, looking at costs and researching flights and accommodation.

In numeracy we have been learning about telling the time to the nearest 5 minutes. We have also practised our multiplication skills through games and written methods



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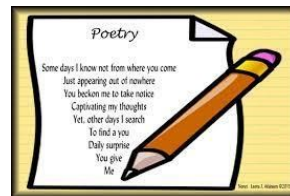


LITERACY

We have read many poems and discussed our understandings. We have developed our skills writing riddles and enjoyed playing games to guess them.

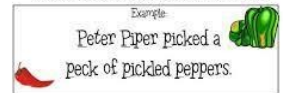

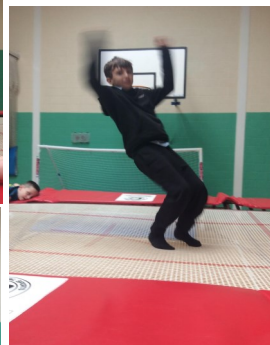
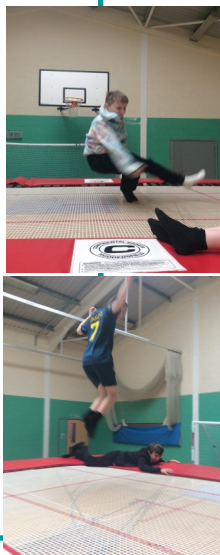


In SMSC this term we are exploring New Zealand. We have researched key facts, looked at the population, religion, wildlife, currency and its capital city.

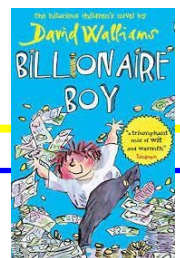
In outdoor education we have enjoyed building bonfires in our outdoor ed area. We have had several visits to the woods, exploring caves and enjoying the wilderness.

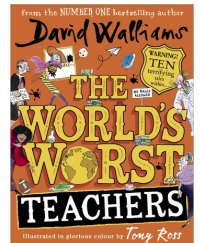
Hi and welcome to the termly update on the wonders of Hackpen class.

Every pupil in Hackpen has continued to progress in their core lessons of Maths and English!

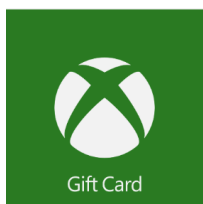


P.E has been a hit this term with trampolining being the sport of choice.

In SMSC we have been studying the continent of Australasia. Our chosen country was Australia. The boys have thoroughly enjoyed looking at Australia's deadly animals!



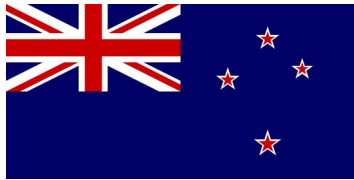

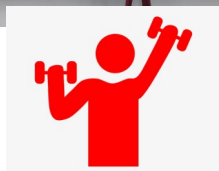
NHA Site Updates

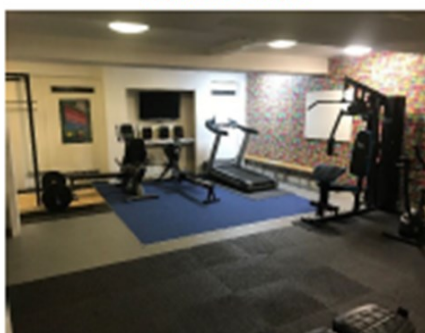

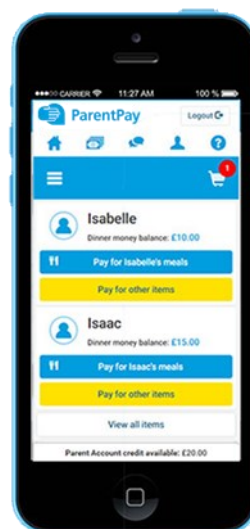
